

Research Spotlight: How Doctors Might Use Deactivated HIV to Cure Leukemia

After two decades of research, researchers have been experimenting with a rare new treatment to help cure leukemia. By disabling the HIV virus, researchers are able to harness the HIV virus' ability to insert new genes into a patient's T-cells in order to kill the cancer. The therapy works by first engineering out all of the properties of HIV that could cause

somebody to get sick. Next, billions of T-cells are taken from a cancer patient and altering the DNA in the cells with a harmless form of the HIV virus. The cells themselves are programmed to recognize and kill the cancer and are placed back into the person's body.

Still skeptical? In a study of 30 children of adults who received the treatment, twenty-three of the patients are still alive and 19 have achieved complete remission. One particular case involves a man named Marshall Jensen who was diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia in 2012. He spent two years traveling around American looking for a treatment when in Philadelphia he stumbled across the HIV treatment. The treatment was successful and in November he returned home after being told he is in remission. In another case, an 18-year-old boy had tried everything from chemotherapy to bone marrow transplants when he discovered the T cell study trial. Eighteen weeks post-treatment he is healthy, studying to get his driver's license and trying out for his high school baseball team.

With innovative treatments like these, one day, leukemia might be history.
